Greg, Bob and Jenny looked on the Internet to see which car would be best for their families.

Read the texts about cars and the notes about the students' families.

Then do the exercise on page 4.

Leaf – “hybrid”

Good points: A “hybrid” car has a petrol motor and also an electric motor. So it's good for nature and half your fuel may be free. The Leaf can carry four people: the driver and one other passenger in the front and two on the back seat. It has a big boot at the back, to carry bags of food and other boxes. For short trips in town, you can use the electric motor. For long trips on roads outside of town, you may need the petrol engine.

Bad points: If you have to buy energy from the electric company, you won't save any money on fuel.

Price: € 25000

Buffalo SUV – very big

Good points: The Buffalo SUV can carry five people, two in the front and three in the back. There's plenty of room behind the back seat for shopping bags or large boxes or even one or two large pets with room to lie down. The body of the car sits high above the road on large wheels, so you can also drive it on rough country roads and across fields. Some SUVs are hard to drive on windy days, but the Buffalo is heavy and the wind doesn't bother it. It's good on the open road.

Bad points: Because the Buffalo is very big and heavy, it uses a lot of petrol. It's not good on narrow city streets and parking can be a problem.

Price: € 35000




Clever Car – very small

Good points: This car carries two people and has a small place behind the front seats to carry two or three bags from the supermarket. Because it's small, the Clever Car doesn't use much petrol. You can drive 400 km before you have to stop for more petrol. It's a little car, so it's easy to park. That means you can usually find a place on the street, and you don't have to pay at a car park.

Bad points: Especially on windy days, the Clever Car can be hard to drive on the roads outside town. Also, you do not want to hit or be hit by a bigger car or a large truck.
